School District Use of Personal Information Notice

On September 1, 1998, the Greater St. Albert Roman Catholic Separate School District No.734 is required to act in accordance with the Freedom of Information and Protection of Privacy Act (FOIP) which sets out standards as to the collection, use and disclosure of personal information.

The following are examples of how personal information may be used for school related activities and are not intended as an all-inclusive list. These activities form a vital part of a healthy and functioning school and the participation of all students in these activities is viewed as an important part of every student's education.

- 1. - 4. The use of a student's name telephone number, school, grade, parent's name and related contact information for the purpose of taking attendance, emergencies, fieldtrips, planning and/or other school sponsored activities.
- 5. The use of a student's name, school, grade, photo, academic information and/or written material for the school newsletter, yearbook and/or other school publications.
- 6. The use of a student's name, school, grade and/or photo for athletic events, fine arts productions, presentations, fairs celebrations and/or other school sponsored activities.
- 7. The use of a student's photograph, video tape, audio tape and/or interview by the school District personnel or activities held outside of the school.
- 8. The use of a student's name, address, telephone number, school, program, grade, parent's name and related contact information for the purpose of satisfaction surveys.
- The use of a student's name for individual class, club, team and/or group photos/videos/images taken at school sponsored activities for display in the school.
- 10. The use of a student's photo/video/images taken by school District personnel of classroom or other school sponsored activities held within the school for educational purposes.
- 11. The use of a student's name, photo/image, birth date, parent's name, telephone number, address and any student health and/or relevant personal information to assist authorized individuals in responding to emergency situations relating to safety and security, for law enforcement purposes and other legal requirements, and to assist who have severe or life-treating medical or other conditions.
- Note: When the use of a student's name, photos and/or videos by the school board, media or to other outside organizations, where individual students are identified or interviewed and the material will be used outside of the school District, a separate and specific consent is required. Events that are open to the general public, are considered public events, Greater St. Albert Catholic Schools cannot control or prevent the further distribution or use of photos, videos, images or other personal information by those who attend.

Written consent for your child to participate in these activities is **not** being requested. On occasions there maybe concerns with uses of this information, if this is the case, please contact the school principal where your child attends to discuss your concerns. Re: Christian Family Living/Human Sexuality Program

As part of the Christian Family Living program, we cover the human sexuality component. It is important to inform all of our parents of the curriculum outcomes.

For these lessons we use a resource called Health and Life Skills Alberta Catholic Schools Human Sexuality Outcomes Grade 4 - 9. This resource has been approved by the Bishops of Alberta and covers, from a Catholic faith perspective, the outcomes for human sexuality from the Alberta Learning Health and Life Skills Program.

More information regarding the details of the program and the audio-video resources used is available in your parent handbook or from your child's teacher, the school principal or Colin Loiselle, our Religious Education & Christian Family Life consultant, at 459-7711 Ext. 140. The lesson plans themselves are available on our Division website at www.gsacrd.ab.ca. On the home page, simply click once on 'Navigation' in the upper right hand corner. A number of lists will appear. At the bottom of the list entitled Parents, you will find the item Parent Resource Library. The Human Sexuality lessons are the first item and are listed by grade level. Simply click on the grade level.

The outcomes at the grade nine level are as follows:

- The student will explore ways of coping with one's unique and diverse growth: physical, emotional, sexual, spiritual and social.
- The student will identify what constitutes sexual assault and explore the sources of support for the victims.
- The student will examine chastity as the responsible choice in determining sexual behavior.
- The student will critique the myth of "safer sex practices".
- The student will explore our Catholic teaching that human life must be respected and protected from the moment of conception.
- The student will identify the responsibilities and sources of support associated with pregnancy and parenting.
- The student will develop strategies to help prevent or reduce sexual risk; e.g. abstain from drugs and alcohol, date in-groups, and use assertive behaviour.

Family life/sexuality instruction is presented in the context of our faith tradition. As a class, we review the concept of puberty and all the changes associated with this stage of their life. They will also review the human reproduction system with terms appropriate to their grade level. Students are reassured that each is a unique individual that matures and develops at their own rate. Students will also examine how media can reduce the human person to an object. We also discuss pornography and how it degrades a human person. In order to make good and life-giving choices, students need an informed conscience, which is formed in the light of Sacred Scripture, Gospel values and the teachings of the Church.

Please be informed that the family life/sexuality instruction will start in spring and could continue into June. We recognize that parents are the primary educators and, hence, have the right to exempt their son or daughter from the human sexuality outcomes instruction.

2018-19

The Middle Years International Baccalaureate Programme is designed to increase students' awareness of their own learning, to develop globally aware citizens and to increase their intercultural awareness. The IB program provides a philosophy that is added to our Alberta curriculum. **Each student in the school** receives an exciting educational program and is exposed to the content, aims and objectives of the IB MYP program at Vincent J. Maloney Catholic Junior High School.

The International Baccalaureate Organization maintains strict standards with regards to the awarding of an MYP certificate. At VJM students have the choice of two program tracks within the IB Program. The IB Advanced Certificate Track and the IB Regular Certificate Track.

To qualify for the IB Advanced Certificate, students must select one option from the IB Language B Grouping as well as they must have at least one option from the IB Fine Arts Grouping. Students will be expected to maintain their student portfolio throughout their three years at VJM. In their grade 9 year, students must also complete the IB Community Project in order to qualify for their certificate.

In the IB Regular Certificate Track students must select options from a minimum of **two** of the three IB subject groupings provided. For the regular track, students who select, for example, Drama, Coding, Sports Medicine, and Fast and Furious would qualify for the Regular certificate as students are taking a subject from the Design and Fine Arts groupings. It is expected that students keep and maintain their portfolios for the three years they attend VJM. As well, in their grade 9 year, students must complete the IB Community Project in order to qualify for their certificate.

Option Course Menu GRADE NINE - 2018-19

Our option course menu includes course offering from French Language, Fine Arts, Communication & Technology Foundations (CTF) & Design and Complimentary courses.

The CTF curriculum has five areas of possible study. *Business, Communication, Human Services, Resources and Technology* represent occupational groupings found within industry. These occupational clusters are aligned with the Career and Technology Studies (CTS) occupational clusters as well as the National Occupational Classification. An occupational area is a grouping of courses that focuses on attitudes, skills and knowledge related to specific work areas. The main goals of courses in the CTF cluster is:

CTF and the Cross-curricular Competencies

CTF emphasizes the development of cross-curricular competencies through an exposure to the occupational areas. A cross-curricular competency is an interrelated set of attitudes, skills and knowledge that is drawn upon and applied to a particular context for successful learning and living.

CTF and the Learning Journey

CTF supports a learning journey where students explore interests and passions while developing skills and cross- curricular competencies and making connections to career possibilities and technologies within any combination of the CTS occupational areas. Students work toward a shared goal by creating a product, performance, completing a challenge or service.

Alignment with CTS

CTF supports the transition to the high school CTS program by developing the foundation for students to make reasonable choices as they consider CTS courses. CTF provides students with a strong foundation of attitudes, skills, knowledge and practical experiences related to occupational areas that will assist them in making informed decisions prior to entering the senior high school CTS program. CTF is NOT a prerequisite for high school CTS.

NOTE: Several options are listed below. The availability of option offerings is based upon student enrolment, human and budget resources. Once the options are determined, we will make every attempt to place students in options of their choice but because of the high demand it may be necessary to substitute certain options.

IB Language B Grouping

FRENCH 9 (Advanced)	Full Year
Advanced French has the same themes as French 9; however, a greater emphasis will be placed on enrichment activities and the development of skills to facilitate students' entrance into high school level French course. Students entering this course should have a good attitude, motivation, interested in improving all components of the French Language. Teaching and assignments will be tailored to meet individual needs and interests.	There are no extra fees or materials for French.

FRENCH 9 (Regular)	Full Year
The goal of this French program is to provide opportunities for students to develop knowledge, skills and attitudes necessary to communicate in French in a variety of real life situations. Each level specifies expectations in four integrated components: communication, culture, language system, and strategies for language learning. Themes include: housing, sports and exercise, community as well as holidays and celebrations. The course will be complemented to meet the needs and interests of students. ART SCULPTURE & DRAWING 9	Half Year

Students rent or purchase their own instruments. Semester fees for rentals go toward maintenance, repair & replacement and vary depending on the instrument. The Band Director will help facilitate the rental or purchase process. Students will be responsible for transporting their instrument to and from school; larger instruments are not permitted on the school bus. NOTE: There are a limited number of school instruments available. Priority is given to those who can't afford rental.

DRAMA 9	Half Year
Take drama to another level! Perfect your theatre sports, movement & voice talents, and overall acting skills with the writing, casting, acting and directing of your very own skits. Put on small performances for varying sized audiences throughout the year and take part in all of your favourite drama games! Design costumes and make-up, create the stand put together sound and lighting effects. Get the opportunity to put your knowledge to the test as a member of the stage crew for an actual VJM production. Self-discipline, imagination, teamwork, and the ability to have fun are all needed!	Note: There will be an additional charge to cover the cost of script fees and students may need to put together a simple costume for the end of term performance.

GUITAR 9	Half Year
For students who have taken Guitar 8 or who have strong guitar fundamentals. This option focuses on refining guitar skills such as music reading and performance through active class participation and individual practice. (Secure school storage is available)	Students rent or purchase their own acoustic guitars. Students will be responsible for transporting their guitar to and from school; please note they are not permitted on the school bus. NOTE: There are a limited number of school guitars available. Priority is given to those who can't afford rental or have no way of transporting their guitar between home & school.

IB CTF & Design Grouping

CONSTRUCTION 9 (INDUSTRIAL ARTS) CTF - COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY

CTF 9 is an intermediate course level course that focuses on higherlevel hands-on skills and knowledge as related to construction of real-life products. Students will apply fundamentals of safety, shop management, basic tools and materials, solid stock construction, furniture making and

product management to create wood related projects while working through engaging challenges and applying project management skills. The student will realize that safety is our first and highest concern. Quality of workmanship and product produced is our other important concern. Students

are introduced to leadership as they continue to apply project management skills related to the design cycle in the IB MYP (International Baccalaureate Middle Years Program). Projects in CTF 9 are larger, more in-depth and therefore more costly. Students will be required to perform a cost analysis before starting on their projects. All projects are adjusted to match student readiness for successful completion.

Half Year

There may be additional charge if students choose to advanced projects. Additional cost is to cover materials or special items needed to complete the project.

FOODS & FASHIONS 9 CTF - HUMAN SERVICES - COMMUNICATION

Grade 9 Foods and Fashions builds on prior knowledge and skills from grades 7 & 8. Experience gained in 7 & 8 is an asset, but not a prerequisite. In fashions, students will go through a brief review of safety and basic skills and knowledge. Students will use the design cycle to change/adapt some aspect of their project to personalize it and further their learning of fashions studies. Students will then photograph their projects for their IB Portfolios. During the Foods component of the course, students will take part in a variety of foods challenges that will be student planned. These will include but are not limited to a service component, photography/video component, and an opportunity to have their food critiqued. Students will also utilize the Design Cycle in their planning.

Half Year

Students will be required to pay an additional fee to cover the costs of all material, notions, and patterns for their sewing project. Depending on the project selected, the fee will be between 15 and 50 dollars. This fee will be collected during the first few weeks of classes in September (Term 1) or February (Term 2), after students have decided upon one of the three project options available to them. Students will not have to purchase anything for their projects on their own as all projects will be ordered by and delivered to the school directly. More information on this project will be sent home to parents in a letter at the beginning of each semester.

ENTERPRISE & INNOVATION (BUSINESS) 9	Half Year
Students will spend some time looking at basic financial management including saving and budget. An examination of basic structures of small business in Canada. Students may examine basic fundamentals related to planning, advertising, sales strategies, as well as marketing & development as they apply to small businesses.	There are no extra fees for Enterprise & Innovation.

LEADERSHIP (GOMAD) 9 CTF - HUMAN SERVICES - RESOURCES	Half Year
Go Make A Difference This course will introduce students to basic leadership theories as they pursue leadership roles in the school and community. Students will study and apply theory in developing skills in the areas of self-awareness, communication, planning/goal setting and leadership. Students will develop the skills and knowledge to support them in pursuing a variety of leadership roles such as volunteering in the community, setting up guest speakers and planning school wide fundraising events.	There are no extra fees for Leadership 9.

OUTDOOR EDUCATION 9 CTF - RESOURCES	Half Year
This course is designed to give students an appreciation of the environment and how we interact with it. The focus of the course is: - Outdoor Survival - Shelter Building - Clothing - Menu Planning - Hypothermia - Fire Building The highlight of the course is two-night survival adventure. We will spend 6-8 weeks preparing for the trip and focus on the topics listed above. We will be using the Alberta Hunter Education Guide as our main resource as well as Wildlife Management and Awareness and Contemporary Environmental Issues. Due to the nature of this course, the culminating activity is very important in order to receive the most out this class as possible. Commitment to attending this Survival trip is vital. Please do not register if you do not intend to take part in the trip.	The estimated cost of the survival trip is \$140.00

MEDIA- VIDEO PRODUCTION 9 CTF - COMMUNICATION	Half Year
This course is an introduction to the multi-layered art of film making. The first half of the course acquaints the student with the 'nuts and bolts' of producing videos, from learning how to properly develop a theme and use an editing program, to composing basic scripts, establishing shoot plans and directing a production. The students then bring everything together in a series of video projects which can involve stop-action animation, basic special audio and visual effects, and live talent - all using technology to enhance and invigorate the creative process.	There are no extra fees for Video Production 9.

Complimentary

GIRLS EMPOWERED 9 CTF - HUMAN RESOURCES	Half Year
This is a girls-only option. The mission of this option is to strengthen young women mentally, physically and socially. Discussion of hot topics women face today and exploration of various skills, strategies and tools to make confident choices will empower young girls on their life journey. The class will cover the following topics: women in history, family relationships, relational aggression, media influences, self esteem, self respect & mental health.	There will be a daytime retreat sometime during the course.

MEN OF HONOUR 9 CTF - HUMAN SERVICES	Half Year
MoH is for boys only. The class seeks to empower young men to be themselves. We explore and discuss topics relevant to their daily lives and attempt to dispel many of the myths, stereotypes and unrealistic expectations that these boys are compelled to follow. The course seeks to build trust among the members of the class and provide the tools to go out into the world and be role models for other boys as well as, on a personal level to develop coping skills, self-awareness and confidence. Through discussion of various topics and providing engaging activities students will develop personal skills needed to navigate through life. Some of the key concepts and topics to be covered are media and pop culture influence, anger and aggression, identity, leadership, male role models, conflict resolution, problem solving, goal setting, mentorship, family relationships, and masculinity.	There will be an off campus retreat and costs will be announced once the details have been finalized.

SPORTS MEDICINE 9 CTF - RESOURCES	Half Year
This course is intended to provide learning opportunities for students with career plans in medical and related fields, as well as active student athletes. The following topics provide an organizational structure for the course: a) immediate care, prevention, and rehabilitation of athletic injuries, b) intermediate anatomy & physiology c) concussions and knee injuries.	A \$10.00 fee will be charged to cover costs of taping supplies.

WRITERS INK 9 CTF - COMMUNICATION	Half Year
Do you love to tell stories, share your opinions and hook people with your imagination? Then Writers Ink. is the option for you! Try a creative writing course where you are the author and you get to pick your own topics. (Use the writing process to plan, write, revise & edit your own fiction or non-fiction.) This option is for students who love to write and would like to publish their work. It will provide an opportunity for students to write for enjoyment, personal growth and to enter writing contests. Students will explore various mediums such as: short stories, newspaper articles, mini-books, poetry, illustrated children's books, etc. They will revise their work in teams, and then send the finished product off to writing contests and magazines in an attempt to win and/or be published. Most projects will be decided on an individual basis depending on interests of students.	There are no extra fees for Writers Ink. Students will either bring a notebook or a Chrome book to class to write.
